## **New Mexico Counties 2015 Population Estimates At-a-Glance**

In March 2016, the United States Census Bureau released its latest population estimates for counties in New Mexico. The estimates show the population as of July 1, 2015. We examined changes from 2010 to 2015, as well as compared the growth from 2000 to 2010 to the estimated growth from 2010 to 2015.

A number of observations can be made.

- ❖ Of the three fastest growing counties from 2010 to 2015, two, Eddy and Lea, are in eastern New Mexico, with Lea County experiencing the largest growth, up 10.0%. In comparison, from 2000 to 2010, Sandoval County was the fastest growing county in the state, growing by 46%. It has grown by only 6.0% from 2010 to 2015 (4<sup>th</sup> fastest). The growth estimates for Eddy and Lea counties do not incorporate any potential declines in population due to oil and gas job losses from the 2015 estimate date through the middle of 2016.
- ❖ From 2000 to 2010, 14 counties saw their population shrink. So far, from 2010 to 2015, 21 counties are estimated to have lost population.
- ❖ Hidalgo County had the largest population decrease from 2000 to 2010 at -17.5%, and has the second largest population decrease from 2010 to 2015 (-9.6%). Over the past 15 years, Hidalgo County has lost more than a quarter of its population.
- ❖ The three counties with the highest growth rate from 2000 to 2010 contained New Mexico's three largest cities. From 2010 to 2015, none of the three largest cities was found among the top three growing counties.
- ❖ Among the eight counties that grew by more than 10% from 2000 to 2010, three are showing an estimated loss in population during the subsequent five years (Roosevelt, San Juan and Valencia counties).
- ❖ Among the 10 fastest growing counties from 2010 to 2015, two are in the Albuquerque Metro area (Bernalillo and Sandoval counties), one is in the North Central region (Santa Fe County), one is in the Northwest region (McKinley), one is in the Southwest region (Doña Ana County), and the remaining five are in the East region of New Mexico (Harding, Lea, Curry, Otero and Eddy counties).
- ❖ New Mexico now has five counties with a population greater than 100,000. In 2000, there were four.

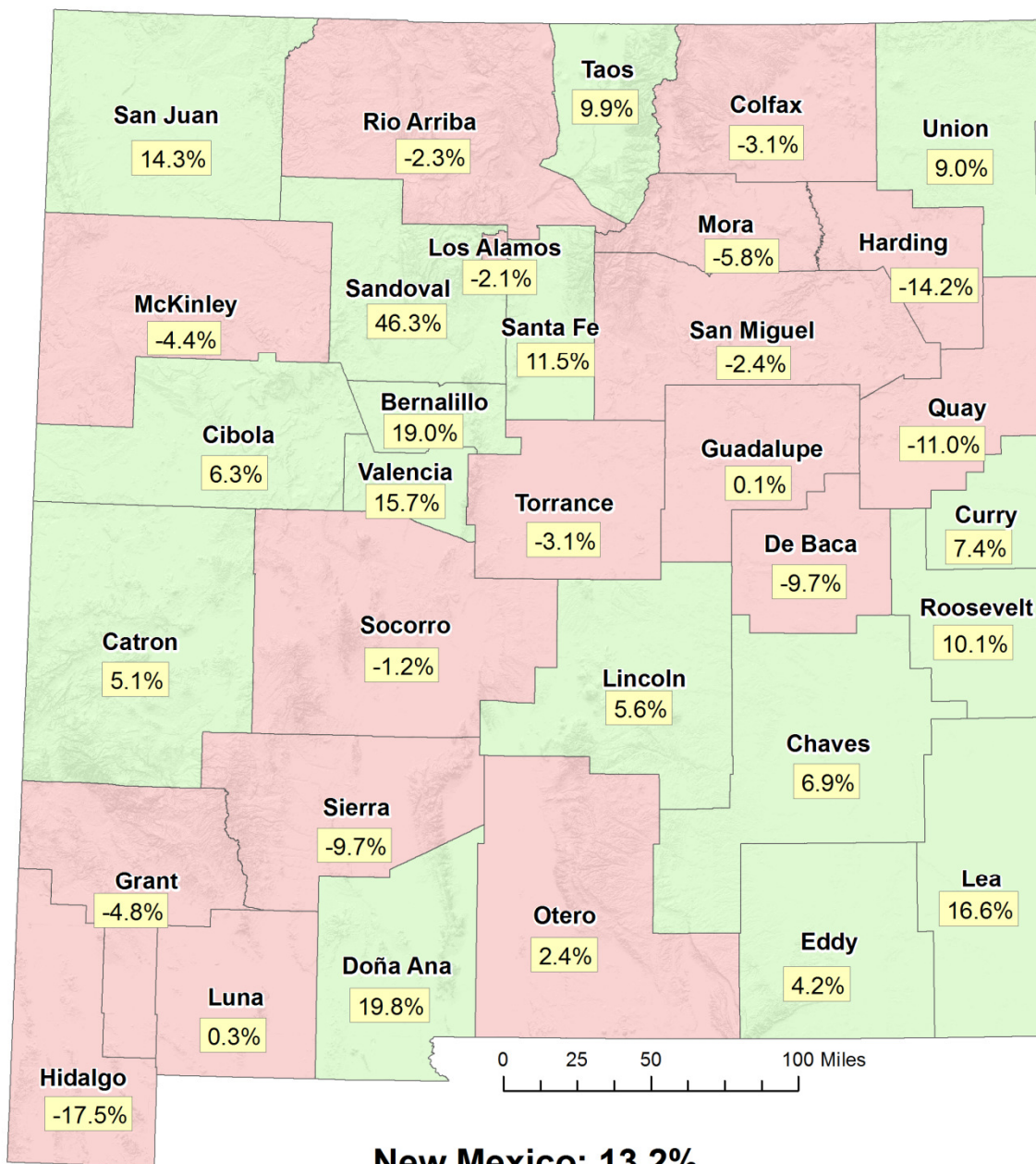

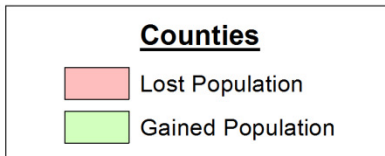

## New Mexico Counties Percent Population Change: 2000 to 2010



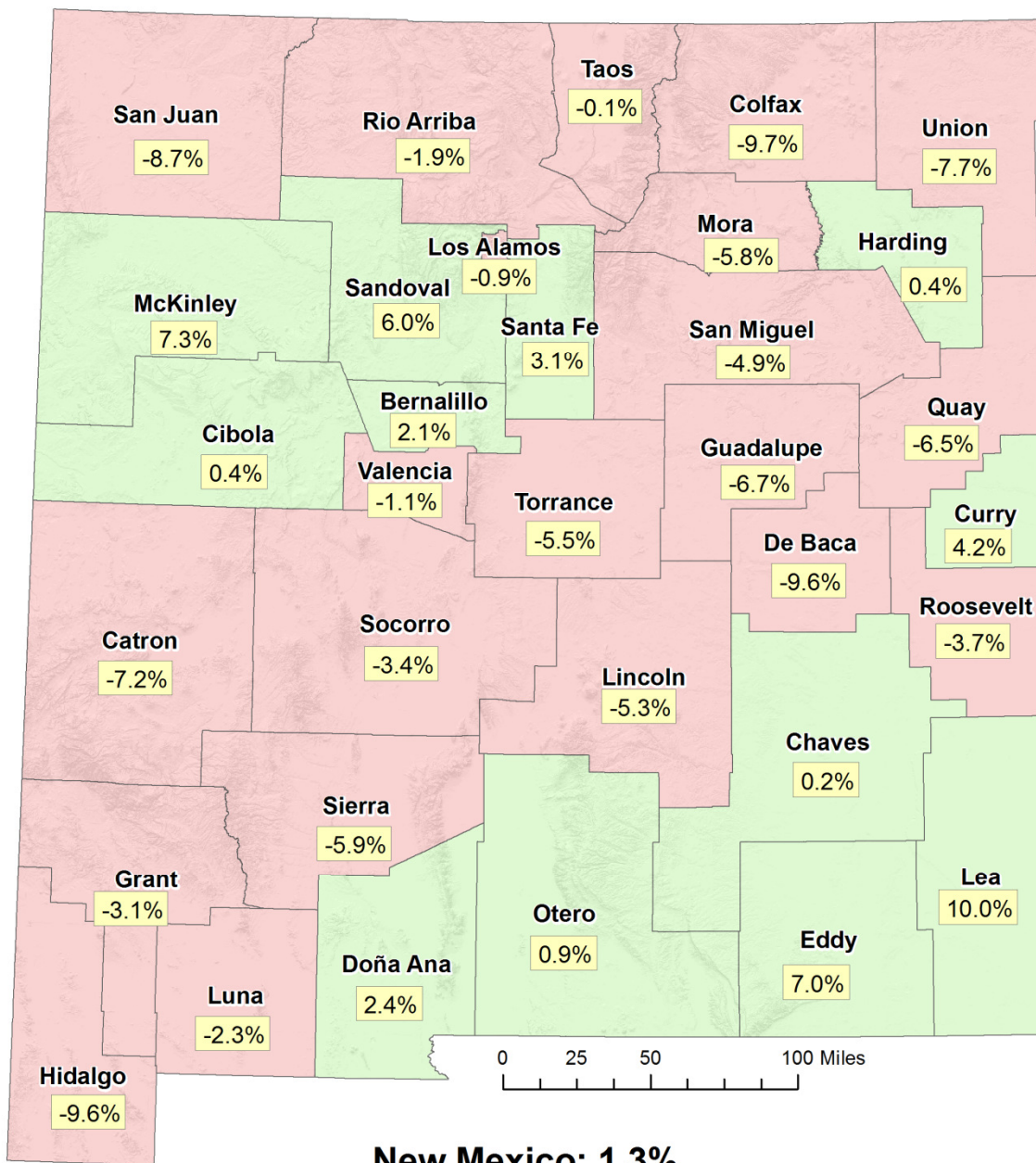
